I am looking for your reaction to the work as you read. Record the page number to which your response is associated. Some things to think about while you are reading:

- Are you making connections to other works of literature? To movies? To poetry? To drama?
- Do you share qualities/attributes with any characters? If so, explain.
- What historical, cultural, and social contextual issues do you see influencing the characters or events of the story?

Once you are finished the novel, please note possible themes, character foils, symbolism, notable characters, and any important philosophical issues the work raises. These can be in list format.

Below is a list of literary terminology with which you should be familiar. **Please define and give an example of each term.** These must be submitted the first day of school. I recommend using the same journal for your reflections and terminology.
